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Vietnam Wall Replica Coming to National WWI Museum and Memorial

The Traveling Vietnam Wall will be available for public viewing on the Southeast Lawn of the Museum and Memorial May 19-30, 2022.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. – This May, the American Veterans Traveling Tribute (AVTT) returns to the grounds of the National WWI Museum and Memorial with the <u>AVTT Traveling Vietnam Wall</u>. The Wall was last at the Museum and Memorial in 2015 and drew crowds of over 50,000 in just four days.

"The Vietnam War was one of the most defining periods in US history and the intersections between World War I and the Vietnam Wall are extensive," said Matthew Naylor, President and CEO of the National WWI Museum and Memorial. "As a Memorial ourselves, we know the importance that spaces and touch play in the act of remembrance and we're honored to again welcome the traveling Vietnam Wall, and the visiting public, to our grounds."

Members of the press are invited to attend an opening ceremony on Thursday, May 19 at 6 p.m. on the Southeast Lawn of the Museum and Memorial. The Wall will remain in place through Memorial Day, Monday, May 30, 2022. It will be formally closed during the Walk of Honor Dedication ceremony at 2 p.m.

The public is invited to view the wall for free at any time, day or night, with the exception of 7-11 p.m. on Sunday, May 29 during <u>Celebration at the Station</u>.

To accommodate the anticipated number of visitors, the Museum and Memorial is recruiting volunteers to assist those paying tribute. Individuals and groups are encouraged to sign up for shifts and lend their support.

An 80 percent scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., the wall measures nearly 400 feet long. It contains every name etched on the original memorial. Since its inception, hundreds of thousands of people across the U.S. have viewed the wall. New this year, AVTT also will display smaller tribute panels honoring American sacrifices in conflicts through the 20th and 21st centuries, including WWI and WWII, 9-11, and Afghanistan and Iraq.
