Membership

Members of the National WWI Museum and Memorial demonstrate their support year-round. With levels from \$55 to \$1,000, there is a membership package for everyone. Membership includes one year of unlimited Museum and Memorial admission for the cardholder, additional Museum and Memorial general admission and/or Featured Exhibition tickets at half price, free or reduced admission to Museum and Memorial education programs, a 10% discount in the Museum and Memorial Store and Café, exclusive members-only tours and events, \$10 off bricks for placement in the Walk of Honor and more.

Main Gallery

The Main Gallery of the Museum and Memorial holds the permanent exhibition, *The World War, 1914-1919*. Through first-hand accounts, engaging exhibits and seamlessly-integrated technology and informative films, the Main Gallery guides visitors through a comprehensive journey of the Great War. Diverse collections from all the belligerent nations help tell the story of this cataclysmic event of the 20th century.



Lower Level

Featuring the Bergman Family Gallery and Open Storage Center, the Lower Level features 4,000 square feet of storage and a 190-foot “coastline” of window cases that allows the Museum and Memorial to display objects and artifacts otherwise unavailable to visitors.

Featured and Special Exhibitions

Wylie Gallery, Exhibit Hall, Ellis Gallery and the West Lobby are all gallery areas for featured and special exhibitions. These exhibitions help tell nuanced stories of the Great War through individual accounts.

Liberty Memorial Tower

The Liberty Memorial Tower rises 217 feet above the main courtyard and 268 feet above the North Lawn, making it taller than the Statue of Liberty. When weather allows, guests can take an elevator ride down (plus 45 steps) to the top of the Tower for the best view of downtown Kansas City.

Museum Store

The Museum store offers a curated selection of gifts and souvenirs inspired by the vast collection of the Museum and Memorial. Browse the assortment of local and unique products, including books, apparel, art, stationary, toys, games, replicas and more. Guests can also shop online at shop.theworldwar.org.

Museum Café

The Café offers a delicious menu, including gluten-free and vegetarian options, and a variety of beverages like local/imported beer and wine and local coffee. Guests dine surrounded by flags of the Allied and Central Powers and a poppy field mural.

Public Programs
